



Deployment Plan

Details:

MET Security Intelligence Division has learned that a protest, "Free Degas Two" is being organized through social media, by a group, known as Extinction Rebellion. It is scheduled to take place on July 8, 2023, between approximately 1100 hours and 1230 hours. The intelligence being received stated that the protest is planned to occur inside the Metropolitan Museum of Art. The Security Department has prepared the following Deployment Plan in the auticipation of the event, to ensure the safety and security of the Museum's visitors, staff, and valuable

The intelligence received determined that the primary objective of this protest is to draw attention to the Federal Indictments of Climate Control Activists who were recently arrested for damaging art at the National Gallery of Art in Washington, D.C. Additionally, the protesters aim to raise awareness about the tragic death of Venezuelan Environmental activist Manuel Esteban Paez Teran, who was killed in a gunfight with police in Atlanta. These issues have prompted Extinction Rebellion to take action and bring their concerns to the public's attention.

It is important to note that this group has previously conducted a protest inside Museum on Saturday, June 24, 2023. During that demonstration, approximately twenty participants entered the premises. They had paint-like substances on their hands, tape covering their mouths, and formed a circle around Edgar Degas' statue, "The Little Fourteen-Year-Old Dancer." Fortunately, the protest concluded

Background

On Saturday, June 24th, a group of 20 climate activates staged a powerful <u>Fired Pacinous Tree</u> action at The Metopolata Museum of AT (The Met). Their mission to avaisate the public to the grossly <u>draconium changes</u> presend against Joanna Smith and Tim Martin for their peaceful and symbolic action at the Mational Callery of Ari to Washington, D.C. on April 27th. These charges serve as a distressing example of the systemic repression endured by the climate movement, for simply highlighting the urgent need for our leaders to act on the climate and ecological emergency. It is crucial for everyone to condems such unjust changes.

We invite you to join use for an even more impactful action at the Met on Saturday, July 8th. Our aim is for all members of the public to turn out, not just a secret, select club. Just like Juanna and Tim. we want to make musem-goers pause and deeply reflect on the contradiction of admiring art museums as symbols of culture and civilization while our planet is engulfed in flames. The survival and preservation of the natural world are fundamental to sustaining human creativity, expression, and cultural development.

Action Overview

Choose an artwork based on its relevance to social justice issues, your personal connection, or simply its popularity (we want maximum engagement with the public!). Sit down in front of the artwork with a sign, remaining silent throughout. Silence holds power.

Security will inevitably ask you to leave since Met policies prohibit "unauthorized theater performances" and "picketing." It is debatable whether the action falls under these or other prohibited categories. Stay as long as you feel comfortable.

Action Agreements

By signing up to participate in this action, you agree not to:

- Touch or damage any artwork or its enclosure
- Touch any member of the public or security



Follow-up Investigation





- Collection and examination of evidence
- Interviews with witnesses
- Video Surveillance
- Collaboration with internal departments and external agencies (Police and FBI)

Situational Awareness

- 1. Positioning Maintain self awareness as to your location in a space as well as around people.
- 2. <u>Posturing</u>- Being aware of your facial expressions, stances, gestures, etc. Stay Professional and Courteous!
- 3. Observing- Actively looking for things or persons that are out of place, not quite right. Watch peoples body language.
- 4. <u>Listening</u>- Actively listen when someone is reporting something to you. Even the most trivial thing could be very important.

Having good Situational Awareness will help officers best use the appropriate tactics in any environment.

Modeled following:


National Incident Management System (NIMS)- a comprehensive systematic framework for managing incidents.

Incident Command System (ICS) - A standardized, <u>All-Hazards</u> command, control, and coordination framework enabling a coordinated response among various jurisdictions and agencies


Emergency Operations Center (EOC) Committee Purpose

- Operational Planning: Review and provide recommendations for the National Gallery Emergency Response policies, procedures, and training
- Crisis Operations: Create the strategic and tactical plans (Incident Action Plan) for response and recovery operations
- Create the objectives for response and recovery operations
- Goal is to resume normal operations as soon as practical




Intelligence Gathering

- Identify credible threats
- Review First Amendment Applications
- Establish Joint Operations Command Centers













Climate Activists Goals & Modalities

Goals

- Gain Attention Cross-Media Platforms
- Provoke Law Enforcement Response
- Disrupt Significant Events
- Real-Time Streaming

Modalities

- Notify Media Outlets in Advance
- Communicate with Affiliates in Real-Time
- Enter as Normal Visitation
- Use of Legal to Possess and Non-Prohibited Items
- Usually Demonstrate Within the First Few Hours of Opening

Risks To Your Cultural Property

A qualified restoration team will, more likely than not, restore impacted artifacts, however the indirect costs of environmental demonstrations are often greater than the direct costs:

- Transferred Risk
- Reputational Risk
- Goodwill
- Civil Responsibility



Mitigation Strategies

Detect:

- Situational Awareness
- Screening & Bag Check
- Presence of "Media"
- Educate to Modalities
- Visible presence

Deter:

- Quick Identification
- Immediate Intervention
- Clear Directions

Deny:

- Clear the Impacted Galleries
- Block public footage
- Deny the Activists the Attention they are Seeking

Communicating Risks to Staff & Collections
